
Reading Helps

Prefix: Letter or syllable added to the beginning of a word as in rewind and preview.

^{*}you're: This is a shortened form of you are.

I can talk to Grandpa Chatsworth about how I dislike my ears.




If I try to talk to Sam about my ears, he teases me.

I wish I really didn't care.




I wonder if Liz has discovered my big ears and thinks that they are funny. I would rather do anything than talk to her about my ears.

"Rob, big ears make other people happy," he says.


"Happy about what," I ask.


Can you believe he was pulled out of the ocean by his ears? How unsual is that?
